## **Black History Month Heroes: Video Project**

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- CHOOSE a Black History Month hero. Check out the ARC's list of suggested historical figures and email your top 3 choices to <a href="mailto:arc@rispto.org">arc@rispto.org</a>. The sooner you email, the more likely you will get your first choice. You are more than welcome to choose a person not on the list. Simply email <a href="mailto:arc@rispto.org">arc@rispto.org</a> with your idea.
- 2. **RESEARCH** your Black History Month hero using online resources or books. A great place to start is on the website www.biography.com.
- 3. **PREPARE** what you'd like to tell people about your Black History Month hero. Use the "Black History Month Heroes Question Guide" to direct your presentation. **Be sure to include in your presentation which IB learner profile you believe best describes your historical figure and WHY.**
- 4. **RECORD** a video of what you learned. Check out a sample video <a href="here">here</a>. Your presentation should be <a href="no more than 1 minute in length">no more than 1 minute in length</a>. All we need from you is the presentation about your Black History Month hero...we'll do the rest!

## Tips for recording:

- Be sure to hold your recording device in landscape orientation when making your video:



- Find good light. If possible, record by window light.
- Speak clearly and not too quickly. Many students found it helpful to use a teleprompter app. There are several free ones available if you'd like to give it a try.
- 5. **EMAIL** your video to <a href="mailto:arc@rispto.org">arc@rispto.org</a>. If your video file is too large to email, we suggest sending it via the website <a href="https://www.wetransfer.com">www.wetransfer.com</a>. **Videos are due no later than Monday.**<a href="mailto:January 24">January 24</a>, 2022. Be sure to include the name of the Black History Month hero as well as the name and grade of the student presenter in your email.

The Committee will edit your presentation in the format seen in last year's videos. Be on the lookout for your video to be posted during Black History Month in February.
